

Dearest Residents, Family and Friends:

The seasons of Fall and Winter are upon us, which means shorter days, longer nights and the autumn harvest. This is also the season of Thanksgiving, and we have much to be thankful for in Lower Salford Township.

As most may recognize, development in The Township remains active with several projects nearing, or at, completion, including the new sidewalk installation along Main Street, the completion of the Bergey Mill Road bridge, the reclamation of the Salford Quarry superfund site, and so on.

Other projects being pursued by The Township include the application for funding through the Pennsylvania Department of Conservation and Natural Resources (DCNR) Park Rehabilitation and Development Program to enhance the existing playground at the Alvin C. Alderfer Recreation Area (420 Oak Drive) with an additional 6,000 square feet of ADAaccessible play equipment. The new features will encourage shared experiences between ablebodied and neurotypical children as well as disabled and neurodivergent children, promoting togetherness, accessibility, and fun for all.

For regular readers of the newsletter, you may recall the open space highlight in the Spring/ Summer newsletter. Over 25% of the land within The Township is preserved, protected from development or in an agricultural security area. As a testament to The Township's continued commitment to the preservation of open space in the community, the supervisors have successfully negotiated an Agreement of Sale to purchase the Allebach Tract located generally between Main Street, Quarry Road and Stover Road consisting of nearly 60 acres. While this purchase will come at a cost, it will ensure that the farmland is preserved, and no residential/ commercial development will occur on arguably one of the prettiest viewsheds in The Township. The acquisition of the ground ensures that the ground will be preserved as open space for future generations to enjoy.


I would be remiss in failing to acknowledge the Allebach family in their collective consideration in giving up the development rights to the ground and allowing the purchase by the township. We are truly grateful to all the families who have contributed to the over 1,200 acres of open space owned by the Township and in making Lower Salford Township a great place to Live, Work and Play!

Since the publication of our last newsletter, we have lost our township solicitor, James Garrity. We truly appreciated his trusted council and will miss him not only as our solicitor but also as our friend. Our thoughts and prayers are with Jim's family at this time.



Our annual Fire Prevention Open House this year was joined with the Harleysville Market right here at the firehouse. It was a successful day and we appreciate all those who came out to support the community.

Earlier in the year we took ownership of a new Zodiac rescue boat and trailer funded through a grant with State Rep. Donna Scheuren. This boat and equipment was placed in service this spring after in house training was performed. The Fire company recently just signed off on the order of a new Pierce Enforcer Ascendant 100' Mid Mount Tower. This truck will replace our current 2006 ladder. Tower 89 is expected to arrive in Mid 2029.

NEWS FROM LEDERACH GOLF CLUB



Bergeys Mill Road Bridge Update

It has been more than a year since work began to reconstruct the Bergeys Mill Road Bridge, and over a decade since the bridge was closed and the road open to through traffic. All of that will be changing soon. Montgomery County's contractor, H&K, has been steadily working towards the timely completion of this project. In August, the bridge abutments and pier were completed, and the deck beams were installed. The decking and parapet walls have been installed, and work has begun on the roadway approaches. While final completion and opening of the bridge is expected sometime in late 2025 or early 2026, Mother Nature will ultimately decide the timeline.



EPA Salford Quarry Superfund Site

Another long-term construction project happening in the Township is EPA's Salford Quarry remediation, which began in September of 2024 with active construction expected to last until early 2026. To date, the project has involved removing the uncontaminated top layer of the Quarry, stabilizing the vertical rock wall face, and installing the perimeter subsurface barrier wall, which will prevent groundwater contact with contaminated materials. The final phase of construction activities will be to install the impermeable cap to prevent surface water from entering the containment area. Dan Roth Park Improvements

Throughout the 2025 construction season, the Public Works Department has been making significant improvements to Dan Roth Park, a.k.a. The Duck Pond. Through good fortune, and our connection with Supervisor Dave Scheuren, we acquired and installed two gently used shade canopies and several parking lot lights that were installed around the pond and along the parking lot at Dan Roth Park. This is in addition to improving the dam wall, installing new concrete pads, safety railings, benches and picnic tables, new underground conduit and wiring for the lights, repaving the pathway around the pond, and paving & restriping the parking lot adding much needed parking. All of these improvements, completed by the Public Works team, have really changed the character of this "little jewel" of a park and we hope that everyone will visit and enjoy not only Roth Park, but all the parks and trails in Lower Salford.



Other Park Improvements Slated for 2025...and beyond!

- New water fountains that include bottle filler and dog bowl stations will be installed along our trail system at Alderfer Park, Park Avenue Fields, Reed Park, and Heckler Plains. A portion of the funding for these fountains was obtained through the Schuylkill Highlands mini-grant program.
- Bucher Park will become the new home for a donated play structure and swing set. This addition will continue the improvements at this park, which began with resurfacing the basketball courts and a complete renovation of the roller hockey rink.
- Improvement plans for Heckler Plains Park include a new multi-bay swing set and expanded playground area. The existing swing set is scheduled for removal with new pickleball courts taking its place.
- The Township is also working with several of the local service organizations (Rotary, Lions, Jaycees) to fund and install Automated External Defibrillators (AEDs) at high-traffic park and trail locations where commercial power exists.

PUBLIC WORKS

Winter Road Maintenance & Resident Responsibilities – Quick Guide

Which roads are plowed first? We maintain over 100 miles of roads (80+ Township, 20 PennDOT). During a storm, major roads (e.g., Rte. 63, Rte. 113, Wambold Rd., Oak Dr.) are plowed first for emergency access. Secondary roads (e.g., Maple, Kulp, Yoder, etc.) come next, followed by neighborhood streets and cul-de-sacs. These priortieis align with the volume of traffic that use the roads in the Township. It typically takes about 9 hours to clear all roads after a 'typical' 3-6" snowfall. The Public Works Department has the capability to deploy over 15 plow vehicles. Please be aware that The Township does not plow our park trails or parking lots. Interested in part-time plow driving? Contact the Township! **Removing Snow**

What are my responsibilities as a homeowner?

- Clear sidewalks within 10 hours after snow ends (if snow ends after 6 p.m, have sidewalks clear by 11a.m).
- Clear snow from fire hydrants near your property.
- Avoid parking on streets during snow events—this helps plows do their job more efficiently.
- If you live on a Snow Emergency route, move vehicles during declared emergencies. https://ecode360.com/9509631#9509633

Why does the plow push snow back onto my driveway? The Public Works Department's practice is to plow every street from curb to curb, or from edge of pavement to edge of pavement. There are several reasons for this. First, it allows for the full use of our roads, uninterrupted mail delivery, it clears snow from storm drains and drainage swales, and it provides plow drivers a place to put future snowfalls. Thank you for your understanding!

Why is there still snow on my street after plowing? Regardless how good a job the Public Works Department does in plowing your street, snow can remain after plowing; we salt roads afterward to melt residual snow. Please don't shovel or blow snow into the street—it's prohibited by ordinance (§140-28).

How can I stay updated on snow events? Follow updates via ReadyMontco, Constant Contact, Township website, and social media.

What materials are used to treat roads?

- Before storms: Salt brine (diluted rock salt) as a preventative measure. Storm timing, forecast certainty, type of precipitation, and resources are all factors that determine when we salt the roads.
- · During storms: Rock salt (sodium chloride); calcium chloride is added in very cold temperatures for extra effectiveness.

Mailbox Policy Mailboxes in the Township right-of-way must follow USPS standards (41-45" high, 6-8" from curb). The Township is not responsible for damage from plowed snow. If a mailbox is struck by a plow, report it within 48 hours—up to \$50 may be reimbursed if the installation complies with U.S. Postal Service guidelines.

Winter Home Prep Tips Check/replace weather-stripping on windows and doors. Shut off and drain outdoor faucets and sprinkler systems to prevent pipe bursts.

Leaf & Yard Waste Drop-off Drop off leaves and yard waste (no grass) in biodegradable bags year-round at The Township Building, 379 Main Street (back lot). Bags are available at the Township Building (2 for \$1, 50 for \$22).

Christmas Tree Disposal Drop off undecorated trees at Jacob Reiff Park (Upper Mainland Rd. lot) through February 28. Trees will be chipped for park mulch.

Jacob Reiff Restoration Part II: Breathing New Life into the Skippack Creek

Big things are happening at Jacob Reiff Park! The Perkiomen Watershed Conservancy and Lower Salford Township have teamed up to bring the Jacob Reiff Restoration Part II project to life—a dynamic, hands-on effort to restore one of the most impaired stretches of the Skippack Creek.

This bold initiative combats stormwater runoff, erosion, sediment build-up, and vanishing riparian buffers. The plan? Reconnect the creek to its natural floodplain, regrade steep banks, and build a stunning two-acre rain garden filled with 10,000 native plants. This living sponge will slow stormwater, recharge groundwater, and give wildlife a serious boost.



But that's just the beginning.

Over 500 feet of badly eroded streambank will be restored using nature-based solutions like root

wads and coir mats seeded with native plants. These tools not only stabilize the banks, they also create critical habitat for fish, frogs, and other creek critters.

Meanwhile, a heavily damaged stormwater channel—carving its way from nearby fields will be transformed. Picture a winding green corridor lined with native grasses, regenerative pools to slow the flow, and a final stop at a new rain

garden before rejoining the creek.

Add to that 300 native trees and shrubs, two acres of newly-planted streamside buffer, and you've got a solution for long-term stream health.

And the best part? This project is powered by people. With over 5,000 hours of volunteer time on deck, students, civic groups, and corporate teams will help grow, plant, and protect this vital waterway.

The Reiff Restoration project isn't just about fixing a creek—it's about reconnecting a community to its watershed and proving that with the right mix of science, teamwork, and grit, we can bring our waterways back to life.







Through the efforts of our predecessors, the Township has preserved over 1200 acres of land accounting for over 13% of the entire Township. And with the addition of private landowners putting their land in the Agricultural Security program the percentage increases to over 23%! Whether through conservation, legal protections, or sustainable management, preserving land offers a range of important environmental, economic, and social benefits. Here are some key advantages:

Environmental Benefits:

Protects Biodiversity

Preserved land provides a safe habitat for plants, animals, and insects, many of which may be endangered or threatened.

Improves Air and Water Quality

Forests and wetlands filter pollutants, protect watersheds, and help maintain clean drinking water sources.

Natural lands act as carbon sinks, absorbing CO₂ from the atmosphere, and helping to regulate the global climate.



Freedom Valley Medical Rescue is proud to support two free programs that can help save lives during a medical emergency: the Vial of Life and PennDOT's Yellow Dot Program. Both are designed to give first responders immediate access to your critical medical information when

you can't speak for yourself. The Vial of Life stores details like medical conditions, medications, and emergency contacts on a form kept on your refrigerator — a place responders know to check. The Yellow Dot Program places a yellow sticker on your car window, alerting responders to a medical information form in your glovebox, which is especially helpful after an accident or medical episode on the road.
